

The Canadian Board of Genetic Counselling (CBGC) is committed to ensuring that members of the Canadian public are receiving genetic counselling services from health care professionals with a standard level of knowledge, skills, attitudes, and judgement. Genetic counsellors granted the credential CCGC (Canadian Certified Genetic Counsellor) and/or its French equivalent CGAC (Conseiller(ère) en génétique agréé(e) du Canada), have demonstrated these standard knowledge and practice competencies.

The year 2023 is a landmark year for CBGC, marking the **25th anniversary** of the Canadian Genetic Counselling Certification process. CBGC is proud to have one of the longest standing genetic counselling certification systems in the world!

With genomics playing an ever-increasing role in health care of Canadians, CBGC's mission has never been more important:

To protect the public by setting and maintaining certification standards and to promote the value of Canadian board certified genetic counsellors for quality health care delivery.



UNIQUELY CANADIAN

CANADIAN CERTIFICATION REFLECTS
THE CANADIAN CONTEXT OF GENETICS
IN HEALTH CARE.

Recognizing the importance of an independent certification board, the Canadian Association of Genetic Counsellors (CAGC) mandated the creation of an independent Canadian Certification body to oversee national certification of genetic counsellors. The Canadian Board of Genetic Counselling-Conseil Canadien de Conseil Génétique (CBGC-CCCG) was incorporated on July 12, 2019.

The three major activities of CBGC are administering the certification exam, reviewing recertification applications and assigning continuing education credits to educational events. For more information on these activities, visit the CBGC website: https://www.cbgc-ccg.ca/

The CBGC is also actively engaged in reviewing and updating Canadian core competency documents upon which the certification exam is based.

THE ORIGINS

In the early 1990's the Canadian Association of Genetic Counsellors was finally taking shape and there was a core group of committed counsellors who kept moving the association forward. The next step was to form a Certification Board within the CAGC and create a national credentialling exam for the purpose of Canadian Certification. There were eight members of that first board from different parts of Canada, and a variety of backgrounds and professional experiences prior to actively working as genetic counsellors in Canada.

These intrepid volunteers started by looking at what other similar health professional groups had done and how they had accomplished Canadian certification. They also looked outside the country to see what others had done.

They learned the fundamentals of exam preparation, question writing, question validation, exam validation, as well as the intricacies of certification examinations metrics. This first certification board dedicated tremendous energy and time to accomplish the goal of certification in Canada- all of which happened 25 years ago when it was not as easy to communicate as it is today (no zoom meetings!).

THE FIRST NATIONAL CERTIFICATION EXAM IN BANFF, ALBERTA-1998



After a four-year long process of diligent preparation, the time came for the first exam administration. It was the Fall of 1998 and Canadian GC certification was the culmination of a move toward more consolidation of the knowledge and scope of practice of genetic counsellors. There were 49 exam writers for the inaugural exam. Today, there are currently 372 Canadian Certified Genetic Counsellors.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

THE NATIONAL CERTIFICATION
CREDENTIAL IS AN IMPORTANT BASIS
FOR THE EVOLUTION OF PROFESSIONAL
LEGISLATION AND REGULATION IN
CANADA.

The genetic counselling profession is currently unregulated in Canada and, as such, practitioners are not governed by provincial and territorial legislation, which ensure safe, competent, and ethical practice in the interest of public protection.

The CBGC considers professional regulation by the various provinces as a key goal for the Canadian genetic counselling community and our patients.

National certification demonstrates competence of the genetic counsellor and a high level of commitment to the practice of genetic counselling in Canada. The CBGC is working towards the following goals:

- Consider moving the next exam to February 2025 (in lieu of August 2024) to see if this improves the interest for the CBGC exam among Canadian genetic counsellors
- Collaborate closely with the CAGC and individual provincial associations to support regulations efforts
- Create a pathway for ABGC diplomates from ACGC-accredited programs to apply for CBGC recognition and/or credential verification for professional regulation or licensure efforts
- Improve communication with CBGC diplomates, Canadian and ACGC accredited genetic counselling training programs, and new genetic counselling graduates outlining the benefits of Canadian certification
